Roche expands HIV Global Access Program to include EID testing

Program expands access to care through special pricing

Roche recently launched the Global Access Program for HIV viral load testing which expands access to diagnostic testing. Roche supports the UNAIDS 90:90:90 goal and the Diagnostics Access Initiative by expanding access to testing through affordable pricing to those countries hardest hit by the disease. The Program, in partnership with UNAIDS, CHAI, PEPFAR, and the Global Fund on a new Global Access Program for HIV viral load testing was launched at the 69th UN General Assembly. Through this program, Roche is providing special access pricing on the COBAS® AmpliPrep/COBAS® TaqMan® HIV-1 Test version 2.0 for qualifying organizations in eligible countries.

In July 2015, during the 8th IAS Conference on HIV Pathogenesis, Treatment and Prevention in Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada, the announcement was made to expand the program to include early infant diagnosis

Eligible Organizations - Organizations eligible to purchase at the Global Access Price:

Donor agencies such as UNITAID, PEPFAR, USAID, Global Fund, etc. and Government agencies based outside the country but who are supporting implementation locally such as the CDC (USA) and Oxfam (UK)

Governments or Government-funded Institutions such as Ministry of Health, National or Regional MTB centers, associated hospitals, armed forces, prison services



Non-Government Organizations and UN related organizations working for or in those countries such as International Office of Migration (IOM) and United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR)

Not-for-profit welfare organizations helping those countries with better diagnostics such as Médecins Sans Frontières, and other humanitarian organizations such as UNICEF, Savethe-Children and the International Committee for the Red Cross (ICRC)

Not-for-profit private organizations whose mission is in line with humanitarian principles such as private charities and/or private non-for-profit hospitals and clinics.

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
